OFFICE OF THE COUNTY CLERK

The Cherokee County Commissioners met February 27, 2012. Those in attendance were Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand. The Pledge of Allegiance was said by all present. Commissioner Collins made a motion to approve the minutes for February 13, 2012 as presented by Clerk Gatewood; the motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Hilderbrand, and Collins voting in favor. Commissioners Hilderbrand, Garner, Collins, and County Clerk Crystal Gatewood signed off on the documentation. Commissioner Collins made the motion to approve the minutes as submitted by Clerk Gatewood for the Special Meeting held February 21, 2012; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Hilderbrand, Collins and Garner voting in favor. Commissioners Hilderbrand, Garner, Collins and County Clerk Gatewood signing off on the documentation.

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

County Appraiser Nancy Herrenbruck requested Executive Session for Personnel/Non Elected. Commissioner Collins made the motion to go into **Executive Session for Personnel/Non Elected for five minutes** with himself, Commissioners Garner and Hilderbrand, and County Appraiser Nancy Herrenbruck. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand voting in favor. They went in at 10:13 AM and returned at 10:18 AM.

County Counselor Kevin Cure requested Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege involving Pending Litigation. Commissioner Collins made a motion to go into **Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege involving Pending Litigation, for fifteen minutes**, with himself, Commissioners Garner and Hilderbrand and County Counselor Cure; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand voting in favor. They went in at 11:42 AM and returned at 11:58 AM.

Commissioner Collins requested Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege for five minutes. Commissioner Collins made a motion to go into **Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege, for five minutes**, with himself, Commissioners Garner and Hilderbrand, County Counselor Cure, Rick Martin, Deana Randall, Jason Allison, and Jeff Glines. His motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, with Commissioners Garner, Collins, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. They went in at 12:07 PM and returned at 12:14 PM.

MOTIONS

Commissioner Collins made a motion to reduce the asking price of the NSP home, located in Galena, from \$82,800.00 to \$59,900.00 at the suggestion of Myra Frazier, the real estate agent handling the sale for the county to make the home more sellable due to the income guidelines involved set by the grant. His motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners

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Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand voting in favor. County Clerk Gatewood signed off on the documentation.

Commissioner Collins made a motion to add the article for Black History month honoring Charles Drew in honor of his work for developing blood transfusion techniques and the storage of the blood; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Hilderbrand and Collins voting in favor. A copy of the article is attached to the minutes.

Treasurer Juanita Hodgson came before the commission on behalf of the other offices in the courthouse and explained the current computer system was six years old and could not handle the amount of computers needed to run the county government, because the majority of services are on line service connected with the state or federal government. Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to upgrade the courthouse computer system and server, installed at a cost of \$14,000.00 to be taken out of Line Item #103 the Deed Tech Fund and Line Item #100 General Fund - and within that fund designated the Employee Compensation Fund. His motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand voting in favor.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to amend the agenda and move Jan Bolin of Class LTD from 11:30 AM to 11:23 AM; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Hilderbrand and Collins voting in favor.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to amend the agenda and move Kevin Cure from 12:00 PM to 11:35 AM; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand voting in favor.

OTHER BUSINESS

Carl Hays, Environmental Director for Cherokee County, came before the commission to give an update on the C & D Landfill situation, and he reported that Sue Drennan has requested a formal request be written to Charlie Bowers of KDHE to answer the many questions she still has regarding the C& D Landfill. County Counselor Kevin Cure said he would look into it and get back to Mr. Hays and the commission.

Raymond Griffitt came before the commission to discuss a land issue involving the State of Kansas and said he would not be back anymore since the commission cannot do anything in the manner.

Leonard Vanatta, of Road and Bridge, came before the commission and reported the bridge project was coming along. Commissioner Hilderbrand asked Leonard about the County Lot fuel being maxed out and Leonard said they had quite a bit, that we're not maxed out. He also gave a general report on county maintenance and he would check on an area that Commissioner Collins had asked about, that the Gas Service Company had dug up and did not put it back correctly.

Larry Overman of West Mineral came before the commission to discuss a problem with a County Lot employee. The commission said they would look into the allegations and discuss it with County Lot Supervisor Leonard Vanatta.

Wayne Elliott of 911 and Art Mallory brought in an agreement for maintenance on SISCO for one year, the cost for the county will be \$5,891.25. This will cover the server, 8 monitors, 3 towers, and

other misc. items. The money will come out of Line Item #224 - Cherokee County 911 Fund. Commissioners Collins, Garner and Hilderbrand signed off and approved the voucher presented.

Jason Allison of Emergency Preparedness gave an update on the progress of the storm sirens project in the county. The sirens will be here on Wednesday. He said he would get with the commission on locations for the sirens, and Empire District was not going to charge for the electricity needed to supply energy to the sirens. West Energy agreed they will meter any polls in their districts. Commissioners Hilderbrand, Collins and Garner signed off on the paperwork moving the storm siren from the City of Treece to Neosho Melrose.

County Counselor Kevin Cure came before the commission and gave an update on the next tax sale for the county, and was very optimistic about it occurring in 120 days. Commissioner Hilderbrand also is having Mr. Cure look into Cherokee County Commission Districts being re-drawn.

Jan Bolin of Class LTD gave an update on Class LTD. The audit report is on file in the Cherokee County Clerk's Office and is available to the public. She discussed various programs they were working on such, as vehicle detailing, recycling, and shredding documents for jobs for the Class LTD clients. The commission thanked her for coming in and for the update.

ADJOURNMENT

Commissioner Collins made a motion to adjourn at 12:16 PM; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Collins, Hilderbrand and Garner voting in favor. The next regular Cherokee County Commission meeting will be held March 5, 2012 at 9:00 AM in the Cherokee County Courthouse in Columbus, Kansas.







Charles Richard Drew (3 June 1904 – 1 April 1950)

was an American physician, surgeon and medical researcher. He researched in the field of blood transfusions, developing improved techniques for blood storage, and applied his expert knowledge to developing large-scale blood banks early in World War II. This allowed medics to save thousands of lives of the Allied forces.^[1] The research and development aspect of his blood storage work is disputed.^[2] Drew protested against the practice of racial segregation in the donation of blood, as it lacked scientific foundation, an action which cost him his job. In 1943, Drew's distinction in his profession was recognized when he became the first black surgeon selected to serve as an examiner on the American Board of Surgery.

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Early years

Drew's athletic achievements helped win him a scholarship to Amherst College in Massachusetts and he graduated in 1926.^[3] An outstanding athlete at Amherst, Drew also joined Omega Psi Phi fraternity. He attended medical school at McGill University in Montreal, receiving his M.D. in 1933 as well as a Master of Surgery degree,^[3] and ranked 2nd in his class of 127 students.^[3] A few years later, Drew did graduate work at Columbia University, where he earned his Doctor of Medical Science degree, becoming the first African American to do so.^[3]

Academic career

Soon after he began his career due to his excellence, Dr. Drew was selected in 1943 as the first black surgeon to serve as an examiner on the American Board of Surgery. Drew had a lengthy research and teaching career, and became a chief surgeon.

Blood Plasma for Great Britain Project

In late 1940, during World War II before the US entered the war, and just after earning his doctorate, Drew was recruited by John Scudder to help set up and administer an early prototype program for blood storage and preservation. He was to collect, test, and transport large quantities of blood plasma for distribution in Great Britain.^[4] Drew went to New York to direct the United States' Blood for Britain project. The Blood for Britain project was a project to aid British soldiers and civilians by giving US blood to Great Britain.

Drew created a central location for the blood collection process where donors could go to give blood. He made sure all blood plasma was tested before it was shipped out. He ensured that only skilled personnel handled blood plasma to avoid the possibility of contamination. The Blood for Britain program operated successfully for five months, with total collections of almost 15,000 people donating blood, and with over 5,500 vials of blood plasma.^[4] As a result, the Blood Transfusion Betterment Association applauded Drew for his work. Out of his work came the American Red Cross Blood Bank.

Death

From 1939, Drew attended the annual free clinic at the John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital in Tuskegee, Alabama. For the 1950 Tuskegee clinic, Drew and three other black physicians decided to drive rather than fly. Drew was driving around 8 a.m. on April 1. Still fatigued from spending the night before in the operating theater, Drew lost control of the vehicle. After careening into a field, the car somersaulted three times. The three other physicians suffered minor injuries. Drew was trapped with serious wounds; his foot had become wedged beneath the brake pedal. When reached by emergency technicians, Drew was in shock and barely alive due to severe leg injuries. Drew was taken to Alamance General Hospital in Burlington, North Carolina. He was pronounced dead a half hour after he first received medical attention. Drew's funeral was held on April 5, 1950, at the Nineteenth Street Baptist Church in Washington, DC.

A persistent urban legend (even recounted in an episode of the TV show *M*A*S*H* and Philip Roth's *The Human Stain*) holds that Drew was denied care — ironically, a blood transfusion — at a nearby hospital because of his race and bled to death. In fact, Drew was well treated by the hospital. Claims that he was not treated because of his skin color are unfounded.^[5] As Dr. John Ford, one of the doctors traveling with Drew, later explained, "We all received the very best of care. The doctors started treating us immediately. [...] He had a superior vena caval syndrome—blood was blocked getting back




Illustration of Drew by Charles Alston in the collection of the National Archives

to his heart from his brain and upper extremities. To give him a transfusion would have killed him sooner. Even the most heroic efforts couldn't have saved him. I can truthfully say that no efforts were spared in the treatment of Drew, and, contrary to popular myth, the fact that he was a Negro did not in any way limit the care that was given to him."^[6]

- 1981, the United States Postal Service issued a 35¢ postage stamp in its Great Americans series to honor Drew.
- 2002, scholar Molefi Kete Asante listed Drew as one of the 100 Greatest African Americans.^[7]

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National Accreditation

CLASS completed a CARF Accreditation survey during January for Administration and Employment Services. we normally apply for accreditation for all of our services but due to the need for reducing expenditures as much as possible this year, we only applied for accreditation in Employment Service to save us approximately \$8,000. We do not have the final report yet but from our exit interview with the surveyors, there is no doubt that we will again receive the highest level of accreditation which is a 3 year accreditation. The surveyors were very complimentary of our services and administrative operations. We should have the formal accreditation report within 2 – 3 weeks.

SRS License

In January CLASS underwent our licensing review by SRS. We recently received a full license with no provisions. We are proud of our work for and with the people we serve and we are proud of how we conduct our business. We operate our business with ethics and in compliance with all local, state and federal regulations.

Financial Audit

During January you should have received a copy of our financial audit for fiscal year 2011. The audit indicated compliance with all accounting standards and regulations. There were no findings.

New Service Location in Columbus

Over the last several years, the number of adults we serve in Columbus has expanded and many who had been working in the community lost their jobs as work went overseas or the company downsized. We did not have enough space to provide a work environment for the clients or to work on the skills in their person centered plan. As of February 1st we entered into a lease for 6,080 sq ft at 311 N. East Avenue, (where the DePratt business was). We are moving work we have been doing in Pittsburg from Calibrated to the new location and are starting a car detail shop. Clients will continue to do shredding for companies and individuals at our administrative office on Merle Evans. Our hope is that all of our adults who can work will have community jobs. We have an Employment Coordinator position open for Cherokee and Crawford Counties. We begin interviewing next week and hope to have that position filled very soon so we can begin job development in the community.

Services Update

Host Homes – in past reports I mentioned that CLASS started a new service for us called Host Family Home Services. The services are under CLASS' SRS license. We developed the service for young adults aging out of foster care but not yet ready to live away from a family environment. Many times, the individual has lived with a family for years and is an integral part of the family. The parents are not ready for them to leave and the young adult is still benefitting from living with the family. In these situations and for several others we have found the host home service to be a win/win arrangement for all. The service is growing. We now have 4 clients living in host family homes very successfully in Cherokee County and a total of 16 total young adults in our 4 Counties. Lori Hinman is our manager of these services.

Medicaid Managed Care – KanCare

DD Services has had several rough years financially due to the slumping economy causing funding reductions and people losing all or some of their services. Just when we begin to see some economic recovery, the Governor decided that DD services should be included in the State's Managed Care program, KanCare. He wants it done by January 2013 which is very little time to put in place the appropriate managed care protocols. I would like to explain the concerns of people with disabilities, their families, service providers, a number of legislators and even some Managed Care Organizations for the Governor's managed care plan.

1. The Kansas system for DD services already has the elements of managed care through the system of CDDOs including eligibility determination, utilization review and quality assurance. In fact, through our current system, the cost per person for DD services has decreased over \$8,000 per year. Funding is only granted now for the most necessary needs.
2. No other state in the US has done this successfully.
3. The DD system is already underfunded with thousands of children and adults waiting for services, some as long as 5 years now.
4. Even though Kansas' RFP stipulates that DD services system will not change, the MCOs bidding on the State's managed care contract are all for profit. They need to make a profit. Where is their profit going to come from in a system that is already as lean as can be?
5. For the health/medical care of persons with disabilities, it may make sense to have a managed care program. Developmental disabilities are not an illness nor does it go away. The amount of services a person needs can be reduced over time but we already have a system in place that addresses this. As the individual's service need is reduced the funding is reduced.
6. Why would Kansas want to take any money from such an important human service and make it available to out of state insurance companies?

We want to make you aware and for you to understand our concerns and the concerns of many regarding managed care for developmental disability services. if you get an opportunity to discuss this

with legislators, the State 's administration or community members, we would appreciate your support and advocacy for our citizens with disabilities.
